WARNING LETTER

Dear Ms. Mills:

We inspected your firm located at 4709 N. Monroe, Spokane, Washington, on June 15, 16 and 30, 2000, and found that you have serious deviations from Title 21 of the Code of Federal Regulations (21 CFR) Part 110 – Current Good Manufacturing Practice in Manufacturing, Packing, or Holding Human Food. A FDA 483 form (copy enclosed) listing a deviation was presented to you at the conclusion of the inspection on June 16, 2000. This deviation causes your mung bean sprouts to be in violation of Section 402(a)(4) of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act (the Act). You can find this Act through links in FDA's homepage at www.fda.gov.

Your firm's sprouts are adulterated within the meaning of 402(a)(4) of the Act because they are being produced under insanitary conditions that may render the sprouts injurious to health. The conditions under which the sprouts are being produced are considered insanitary since effective preventive controls, particularly microbial testing of spent irrigation water, have not been adopted and implemented by your firm.

This letter may not list all the deviations at your facility. You are responsible for ensuring that your processing plant operates in compliance with the Act and the Good Manufacturing Practice regulations (21 CFR Part 110). You also have a responsibility to use procedures to prevent further violations of the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act and all applicable regulations.

We may take further action if you do not promptly correct these violations. For instance, we may take further action to seize your product(s) and/or enjoin your firm from operating. Please respond in writing within three (3) weeks from your receipt of this letter. Your response should outline the specific things you are doing to correct these deviations. You may wish to include in your response documentation that would assist us in evaluating your corrections. If you cannot complete all corrections before you respond, we expect that you will explain the reason for your delay and state when you will correct any remaining deviations.

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For your information, our investigator noted that your sprouting cycle begins with soaking the mung beans in a 20,000 parts per million chlorinated water solution. Our investigator further noted that you record the measurement on a batch production record. The batch record presented to our investigator did not contain documentation of actual measured values, but rather only identically preprinted preparation data for each batch of germinated seeds. In calculating the concentration of the solution of sodium hypochlorite you are using [i.e., ½ cup bleach (5.25% sodium hypochlorite) per 1.5 gallons water], we find that you are actually using a 1090 parts per million (0.109%) solution of sodium hypochlorite. You need to record the actual concentrations of your seed treatment, rather than assumed values.
