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## Korea's Comments on Bioterrorism Act

### **1. General comments**

The Korean government is well aware of the US government's security concerns since the 9.11 terrorist attacks and its endeavor to reinforce its security against bioterrorism by enacting Bioterrorism Act. The Korean government also appreciates the US government's efforts to share information about the Act by holding seminars and soliciting comments.

However, as the Korean government explained to the US government on various occasions including at the Quaterly Trade Meetings, the Korean government is concerned that the Bioterrorism Act would adversely affect trade between Korea and the US. Particularly, the Korean government believes that the prior notice and facility registration requirements would restrict trade more than necessary. The Korean government hopes that the US government will implement the Act in the least trade-restrictive manner in accordance with WTO/SPS Agreement.

### **2. Specific comments and suggestions**

- a. According to the PNSI, Anticipated Arrival Date should be within 5 days from the submission date for the Web Entry. Given that it takes more than 2 weeks to arrive at a port in the U.S. from Korea, the 5 day timeframe is too short. Therefore, it would be desirable to extend or delete the timeframe for foreign exporters.

- b. Taking into account that English is not a mother tongue for Koreans, it would be desirable to provide Korean language service for Prior Notice and Facility Registration.
- c. It is also necessary to extend the PNSI operation time limit. Due to the 30 minute operation time limit, it is hard for the Koreans to finish the procedures in English in time.
- d. Some of the Korean product names on the list of the Product Code are not correct. In addition, there are missing items. These items should be corrected or added as follows:
