DURING AN INSPECTION OF YOUR FIRM WE OBSERVED:

OBSERVATION 1

Effective measures are not being taken to exclude pests from the processing areas.

Specifically,

1. On November 18, 2009, we observed apparent rodent excreta pellets (REPs), apparent nesting areas, and apparent gnawed hazelnuts in the following locations of the Dry Storage Warehouse south of the processing facility:

- a) At the southwest corner of the warehouse, in each of three stacks of old broken down large cardboards that were inspected, we saw at least 500 REPS within layers of cardboards, two to three piles of cardboard shavings that appeared to be nesting sites, and pieces of hazelnuts and skins.
- b) On the second row of pallets from the south wall, in three out of three pallets of old broken down large cardboards that were inspected, we observed at least 200 REPs within layers of cardboards and inbetween pallets, two piles of cardboard shavings, and pieces of hazelnuts and skins. From one of these pallets, we observed apparent urine stains that fluoresced under the UV light.
- c) At the south end of the warehouse, we observed at least 100 REPS in between stacks of wooden racks of old broken down large cardboards.
- d) At the middle west wall of the warehouse, we saw at least 50 REPs in between stacks of wooden racks of broken down large cardboards dated 2007.
- e) On the third row of pallets from the north wall of the warehouse, we observed at least 20 REPs in between stacks of wooden racks of broken down large cardboards dated 2008.
- f) At the middle west wall of the warehouse, we observed three out of 15 hazelnut kernels that appeared gnawed on the floor under one pallet of partial boxes of hazelnuts.

2. The left bottom end of the screen covering the slotted window south of the In-Shell Warehouse was bent leaving an opening measuring 6 inches by 6 inches. Also, the holes of the screen on this slotted window measures approximately one inch wide.

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3. There is no physical barrier between the Dry Storage Warehouse, Finished Kernel Warehouse and the In-Shell Warehouse. There were at least five uncovered metal totes containing hazelnut kernels in the Finished Kernel Warehouse immediately next to the Dry Storage Warehouse. Additionally, there were 22 uncovered metal totes containing hazelnut kernels in the In-Shell Warehouse.

OBSERVATION 2

Employees did not wash hands thoroughly in an adequate hand-washing facility before starting work, after each absence from the work station, and at any time their hands may have become soiled or contaminated.

Specifically,

- 1. On November 17, 2009, after taking a lunch break at 12:30pm, 9 out of 16 employees did not wash hands prior to dipping in the sanitizing bath and 2 out of 16 did not change gloves before returning to the processing line. Two of the nine employees were observed smoking during the break. Also on the same date at 9:00am, at least 8 employees did not wash their hands prior to dipping in the sanitizing bath and prior to sorting and handling hazelnut kernels with bare hands during their hourly 5-minute break.
- 2. On November 18, 2009, at least 8 out of 16 employees did not wash their hands at 8:00am and after the first 5-minute hourly break at 8:55am prior to dipping in the sanitizing bath and prior to sorting and handling hazelnut kernels with bare hands.
- 3. On November 17 and 18, 2009, at least 5 employees out of 16 dipped only their fingertips in the sanitizing bath prior to sorting and handling hazelnut kernels with bare hands.
- 4. On November 17 and 18, 2009, one employee who was sorting the hazelnut kernels rubbed her nose with hand at least twice each day. This employee did not wash and sanitize her hands after rubbing her nose and prior to sorting and handling the hazelnut kernels with bare hands.

OBSERVATION 3

All reasonable precautions are not taken to ensure that production procedures do not contribute contamination from any source.

Specifically, the plastic curtains between the In-Shell and Kernel Warehouses have residual organic matter on its surfaces. On November 18, 2009, we observed the hazelnut kernels in a metal tote come in-contact with the
