## PFP/IFSS Mission

The Partnership for Food Protection (PFP) is a group of dedicated professionals from Federal, State, and Local governments (partner agencies) with roles in protecting the food supply and public health. The PFP is the structure used to meld and coordinate representatives with expertise in food, feed, epidemiology, laboratory, animal health, environment, and public health to develop and implement an Integrated Food Safety System (IFSS).



## National Curriculum Development

The PFP Training and Certification Work- group is engaged with its regulatory partners in developing a national curriculum standard and framework. This will provide all IFSS food and feed investigators and inspectors a blue print for future food and feed safety training within the regulatory community.



## Program Evaluation

How well does training meet organizational needs and goals? Does training translate into improved performance? What kind of preparation and training should instructors complete before they facilitate courses? These are common questions among partners and ones that are best answered by establishing a robust evaluation process within training programs.
