Preventing Listeriosis

READ ME FIRST

You can play a critical role in preventing listeriosis! The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has developed a program that contains everything you need to educate your community on preventing listeriosis in pregnant Hispanic women in the United States. The program contains the following tools and materials in English- and Spanish-language versions:

Education Toolkit: Community Educator's Guide to a Serious Foodborne Risk

The Community Educator's Guide is a self-contained manual that includes background information, common questions and answers, and printable/reproducible materials. Open the guide with Adobe Reader software (which can be <u>downloaded to your computer</u> for free: https/get.adobe.com/reader). On pages 3-4 in the guide, you will find an overview of the toolkit materials, including assembly instructions. These materials include a consumer brochure, fotonovela, and community flyer.

Poster

A poster, which is great for alerting pregnant women in your community about not eating cheeses made from unpasteurized milk, is available in three sizes: 8.5" x 11", 11" x 17", and 17" x 22". If you don't have the resources to print your preferred size poster, try finding support from a local business or a printer that would be willing to cover the cost of the printing.
