Part II: Research, Teaching, and Clinical Contributions

A. Narrative Report

Dr. Bernstein is a Professor of Pediatrics at Zucker School of Medicine at Hofstra/Northwell in New York, USA. He taps into his extensive 38–year experience as a general pediatrician in private practice, the National Health Service Corps, and as Chief of General Academic Pediatrics at urban, suburban, and rural children's hospitals to promote the health and well-being of children, their families, and their communities. His private, community-based primary care (generalist) experiences in combination with academic leadership responsibilities have provided him with a value-added, translational science perspective, unique from many others in academia. This tacit knowledge enables him to fulfill a lifelong passion of communicating, educating, and translating science into clinical settings, educational venues, policy-making, and media interactions to advance the health of children.

Research is consistently woven into the fabric of Dr. Bernstein's clinical practice, which has served as a "laboratory" for his active studies. His research and quality improvement initiatives focus on issues important to Academic General Pediatrics and community-based practice, including immunizations, infectious diseases, postpartum newborn discharge, childhood obesity, breastfeeding, health promotion, preventive health screening in primary care, technology and medical education. His commitment, innovative spirit, and enthusiasm also encompass many facets of medical education along the continuum from training and mentoring future physicians to fostering lifelong learning and supporting the continuous professional development of practicing pediatricians.

Dr. Bernstein is a voting member of the US Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) Vaccines and Related Biological Products Advisory Committee (VRBPAC) and a former voting member of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Advisory Committee on Immunization Practice (ACIP). He serves as a consultant on the ACIP COVID-19, Influenza, and the Combined Adult and Pediatric Immunization Schedules workgroups. He also is an ex-officio member of the American Academy of Pediatrics' (AAP) Committee on Infectious Diseases (Red Book Committee) and was Associate Editor of the AAP's Red Book Online for 13 years. In addition, he is Editor-in-Chief Emeritus of PediaLink, the AAP's online home for lifelong learning, and past Chair of the interdisciplinary Bright Futures Health Promotion Workgroup, which created a distinctive health promotion curriculum, videos, and a companion educational website (www.pediatricsinpractice.org).

Dr. Bernstein has been Editor of the Office Pediatrics Series in *Current Opinion in Pediatrics* since 1995 and was Senior Editor of Pediatrics on the public website of Harvard Medical School's Health Publications Division for 17 years. He regularly shares his knowledge and expertise by educating the public, writing for health information websites and often participating in media interviews on a variety

of pediatric health care issues including immunizations, diagnosis and treatment of common childhood infectious diseases and conditions, and practical information for parents, teachers and caregivers. In the spirit of lifelong learning, Dr. Bernstein earned a Masters in Healthcare Management (MHCM) at Harvard T. H. Chan School of Public Health, USA in 2013 and has been a faculty member in this Executive Education Masters degree program since. He actively maintains his certification by the American Board of Pediatrics. He completed his residency training in pediatrics at St. Christopher's Hospital for Children in Philadelphia, USA after earning his medical degree from the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey - School of Osteopathic Medicine, USA.

These awards highlight my continued educational contributions and passion for medical education. I am considered a role model for faculty, housestaff and medical students, notably improving the image of the generalist clinician. My goals are (1) to give a realistic view of the talents, abilities, and limitations of a general pediatrician in an ever-changing healthcare environment; (2) to demonstrate similarities and differences in approach to clinical problems, emphasizing the reasons for such variability, pushing learners to think critically, and bridging the academician/specialist/practitioner gaps; (3) to help physicians in training develop sensitivity to the patient care concerns of the referring primary care physician (e.g., providing both clinical and technical support with communication during and after hospitalization); and (4) to teach the art of medicine in balance with the science. The responses of learners have been extremely positive, evidence that these goals are being achieved. Students, housestaff, and faculty frequently seek my clinical opinion on patient-management, particularly focusing on initial presentation in primary care, management using evidence-based medicine, and at what point subspecialty referral or hospitalization might be made.

4. Innovative Educational Programs Developed

"Career in Pediatrics - Emphasis on Private Practice" seminars. From 1987 to 1995, I helped organize annual seminars for the 24 junior residents from St. Christopher's Hospital for Children. Topics were discussed in a "round table" format, such as a journal club and included an overview of careers in Pediatrics, how to choose a quality practice, the academic practicing pediatrician, finances and workload, research opportunities in private practice, women in pediatrics, and managed care/insurance.

Linking Academic Medical Centers and Private Practice. When I was a full-time partner in a private practice in a suburban Philadelphia community, I played a notable role in forging a pioneering model in primary care by uniquely and successfully integrating patient care, teaching at an academic center, clinical research, and community service. This model demonstrated that a meaningful relationship between an academic medical center and private practice can be a reality, with mutual gains for both.

Linking Primary Care and Research. I continue to play an integral role in the development of model programs for conducting quality office-based clinical research. Conducting research in a variety of busy primary care pediatric practice settings (e.g., private practice and academically-focused practices in children's hospitals) has provided valuable insights into everyday practice; the new knowledge generated is relevant to all practitioners. The scrutiny of office routines that accompanies study participation has revealed intriguing information about how our practice functions, continuously helping to improve overall patient care as well.

There are obstacles encountered to conducting research in the office. However, I believe that both the immediate and far-reaching benefits far outweigh these challenges. My experience over the years has helped me to design, organize, and implement studies; I have learned to incorporate time-efficient techniques along with other effective methods of study management into our daily routines. Multiple protocols can be effectively managed in our clinical practice, as several studies in various stages are often being conducted at any given time. With this systems-based approach, our compliance rate with protocols is high, particularly for our socially disadvantaged, urban population in an urban free-standing children's hospital and in a rural children's hospital within a hospital. This is documented by our ability to keep study dropouts to a minimum and parents of our patients are remarkably eager to participate and cooperate in these studies.

Our clinical research studies have had significant impact on the practice of primary care pediatrics and national policy. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) have used these results to make changes in the way previously licensed vaccines are used or to recommend to the FDA that new products be licensed. In addition, I am a member of the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) of the CDC and an Ex-Officio member of the AAP's Committee on Infectious Disease (COID Red Book Committee), whose responsibility it is to develop and revise guidelines of the AAP for control of infectious diseases in children. In addition, the outcomes from our newborn discharge study are helping to monitor federal legislation (The Newborns' and Mothers' Health Protection Act of 1996) and to influence the AAP's Committee on Fetus and Newborn policy statements and guidelines intended to insure the health and well-being of newborns, postpartum mothers, and their families during the first week after hospital discharge. Screening guidelines used in primary care practice (e.g., using Reticulocyte Hemoglobin Content [CHr] for identifying iron deficiency before anemia) have also been enhanced through the results of our studies. Participating in office-based research helps children around the world, makes us better readers of the literature, and expands our professional horizons.

The Academy at Harvard Medical School. I was selected as a scholar with the inaugural group of educators when this Academy was first established at Harvard Medical School in 2001. Its goal was to renew and reinvigorate the educational mission of HMS, bringing together a diverse group of faculty and trainees who share a commitment and passion for teaching as well as a desire to improve the educational environment. As a leader of initiatives in curricular innovation, I received Academy support to contribute to three educational projects including patient/family and physician communication (through "Pediatrics in Practice" described below), creation of a new 4th year clerkship in integrative medicine (through PIME described below), and development of a single pediatric clerkship from three sites with common competencies and standardized assessment. I also served as mentor for a junior faculty Academy member's project on developing a "service learning" course for medical students about in-home respite care.

Pediatric Integrative Medical Education (PIME). I was responsible for the evaluation of this "center of excellence" project in education and research for the provision of integrative health care to children. First organized in 2000, PIME's aims were to develop curricular offerings in pediatric integrative medicine for health care professionals at every level of training; to provide faculty development for health care professionals to improve and update their expertise in teaching integrative medicine; and to do research in the evaluation of integrative medical education. It also disseminated CAM knowledge through its website and postgraduate educational programs to community health care provider-leaders who, in turn, would further disseminate CAM knowledge in their practices.

Bright Futures Health Promotion Curriculum. I am Chair of the Bright Futures Health Promotion Workgroup, comprised of nationally selected educators, nurses, parents, and pediatricians. This Workgroup, established in 1998 with the charge of developing a formal health promotion curriculum for use in Pediatric Residency Training Programs, identified a unique set of core concepts - advocacy, communication, education, health, partnership, health promotion, time management, and cultural competency – grounded in the tenets of Bright *Futures* (i.e., viewing the child within the context of her family and the community where s/he lives). The curriculum consists of an introductory video and eight teaching modules centered on learning the critical health promotion skills that are important at each clinical encounter. The video helps the viewer explore the concept of health, identifying and giving examples of physicians who have incorporated these core concepts into clinical practice. Each of the eight teaching modules can be presented in stand-alone 30-minute interactive sessions prior to continuity clinic; the entire curriculum can be presented in a concentrated time period (e.g., half-day workshop) or over the course of a three-year pediatric residency training program. This comprehensive health promotion curriculum was published by Springer Publishing Company, Inc. in 2005 and national dissemination has been possible through our companion distance learning website (www.pediatricsinpractice.org), which focuses on learning, teaching, and practicing health promotion.

Pediatrics in Practice (<u>www.pediatricsinpractice.org</u>). This website expands our health promotion content into a web-based, distance learning program for maternal and child health (MCH) educators and clinicians. In leading this initiative, 3 concepts – Health Promotion, Faculty Development, and Distance Education – were blended to create a distance educational model for maximal dissemination, implementation, and evaluation of our *Bright Futures* Health Promotion content on local, regional, and national levels. This innovative program is designed to meet the self-directed teaching and personal learning needs of all MCH educators and clinicians, introducing learners to the benefits of reflection in the learning process. This website incorporates interactive technology to encourage reflective learning, including journaling, creating an action plan, and self-evaluation. It provides the opportunity to train and equip MCH leaders with critical teaching skills and the tools necessary for effective standardized education and integration of our health promotion content into clinical practice within the framework and values of the federal government's *Bright Futures* initiative, Healthy Objectives 2020, and HRSA's Maternal and Child Health Bureau's Strategic Plan and Performance Measures System.

PediaLink (The AAP Online Learning Center) is an innovative, online home for lifelong learning and continuous professional development for physicians. As the Editor-in-Chief for PediaLink[®] (www.pedialink.org) for 17 years, I spearheaded the creation of this pioneering learning platform for the 60,000+ pediatrician membership of the American Academy of Pediatrics, who must respond to the current paradigm shift from periodic re-certification to maintenance of certification. PediaLink[®] is individualized, customizable, and confidential as it assists pediatricians to more easily direct, focus, and manage their continuous professional development. PediaLink[®], which stems from the work of the late Donald Schon, is based upon clinical problem solving, self-assessment, and self-directed learning, encouraging medical professionals to integrate what they learn into their daily practice of medicine. My work on this innovative project has led to the development of extensive web-based materials for the ongoing training of pediatricians, moving toward a national curriculum for child health professionals. I have effectively blended advanced technologies with educational strategies to facilitate lifelong learning, self-assessment, physician behavior change, quality improvement, and improved health outcomes. This system and its component features are innovative in transitioning toward maintenance of certification.

Becoming A Reflective Practitioner Online. The current paradigm shift in education not only includes the delivery of information, but moves learners from superficial to deep learning. To complement the above tools being developed for the self-management of practice-based learning, I have spearheaded the creation of a web-based model that incorporates interactive technology. This first generation, online Reflective Exercise is a user-friendly, self-paced learning experience, which produces an opportunity to 1) engage learners in a continuous practice of self-observation and self-evaluation and 2) motivate learners to advance from surface learning to deeper learning. Integrating Reflective Exercise into the learning setting empowers learners to move beyond simple recollection of fact and to synthesize what one learns. This tool, which includes journaling, creating an action plan, and self-evaluation, is intended to expand the expertise of educators, by encouraging them to keep a record of the impact of their teaching and fostering continuous improvement through the concept of collaborative learning. The Reflective Exercise can be found at <u>www.pediatricsinpractice.org</u>.

The Academy of Medical Educators at Zucker SOM at Hofstra/Northwell. I was selected as a scholar with the other notable educators in this Academy. Its goal is to support and invigorate the unique and innovative educational mission of Zucker SOM, bringing together a diverse group of faculty and trainees who share a commitment and passion for teaching as well as a desire to improve the educational environment.

Using Interactive Technology To:

• **Promote Breastfeeding In Primary Care.** I orchestrated all facets of the production of an interactive web-based program to raise awareness and to promote continuation of breastfeeding. This educational platform can be found at <u>www.feedingyourbaby.org</u> and <u>www.pediatricsinpractice.org</u>. It is a user-friendly program that presents educational content about breastfeeding in a dynamic, interactive manner using state-of-the-art touch screen technology during the patient's waiting time in the office. Customizable information and results of a needs assessment in this topic area are printed for the patient to discuss with their provider during the visit. Usage can be quantified to

facilitate informed updates of the material. A randomized, controlled trial analyzed its effectiveness in promoting the continuation of breastfeeding.

- **Promote Smoking Prevention in Young Girls.** I spearheaded the development of the *No Smoking Room*, (www.nosmokingroom.org) a safe, online patient education site created to empower young girls to say "no" to smoking or to encourage those who are smoking to quit. The website engages 8-11 year old girls through high quality multimedia features. Health professionals are also provided with patient education door hangers that direct young girls and their families to visit the *No Smoking Room* and to educate them about this serious public health issue. Complementing this website, a new pediatric tobacco counseling course for health professionals was recently launched on my health professional in applying concrete strategies to open and maintain the conversation with young girls and their families around smoking prevention and cessation.
- Advance Health Literacy for Families. The Child Health Guide (www.childhealthguide.com) is a revolutionary advance in health literacy: it is the only family resource that uses live-action video of real children with real symptoms, illnesses, and developmental milestones. Child Health Guide's rich features, include 200+ videos plus an easy-to-use interactive Symptom Checker, which helps achieve better health outcomes for kids, reduced anxiety for parents, and lower health costs. Working closely with colleagues from Norway, I served as Director of the Medical Advisory Board and envisioned how the use of the Child Health Guide can translate into better usage of medical resources, increased knowledge acquisition and understanding with less anxiety by parents and caretakers, and improved outcomes for children. As a user-friendly program, it has been enhanced for families, by families, to present educational content in a dynamic, interactive manner using state-of-the-art technology.
- Promote Oral Health Using Bright Futures Core Concepts. I spearheaded the creation and formal evaluation of an online curriculum designed to increase the confidence, knowledge, and clinical performance in oral health and Bright Futures philosophy among pediatric residents. The overall goal was to strengthen and expand pediatric residents' roles as care providers in health promotion and preventive services. We first conducted a cross-sectional assessment of a geographically diverse multiinstitutional sample of residents to identify a more detailed look at barriers to applying Bright Futures oral health concepts in continuity clinic. Residents also were found to demonstrate greater skill in communication and partnership building compared with oral health promotion behaviors and performance of an oral examination. Armed with this information, we uniquely conducted the first randomized controlled trial that examines a Bright Futures-based online curriculum about a preventive health service at the national level. We demonstrated that our online educational intervention (https://www.pediatricsinpractice.org/practice_center/pc_tools_oralhealth.asp) provides a replicable national training model that advances important elements of primary care pediatrics and related policy recommendations vital to health care reform. Further education is needed at a national level if we are to meet Healthy People 2020 goals. This RCT reinforced the need to invest in the review of assessment approaches for new online curricula designed to meet the growing preventive services demands on primary care pediatricians.

D. Report of Clinical Activities

1. Clinical Practice and Patient Load

1985-1987 New Jersey

After completing my residency in Philadelphia, I spent two years in the National Health Services Corps in Camden, NJ. I was the only pediatrician practicing fulltime (120 patients per week) in the poorest part of a very poor city. Lashing out at the local government, arsonists destroyed my clinic, yet we continued to see patients during a very rapid re-construction phase. It was critical to our underserved families to maintain continuity, and the community was most appreciative of our efforts.

1987-1995 Pennsylvania

With both active inpatient and outpatient services, the majority of my time at Pennridge Pediatric Associates was involved in direct patient care, seeing approximately 125 outpatients of varying complexity per week in two private offices - one which functioned as a group practice with 3 or 4 members in the office seeing patients at any one time, and the satellite which functioned as a single practitioner office 15 minutes away. The practice annually averaged almost 35,000 total outpatient visits (one-third well and two-third sick) with morning, afternoon, and evening hours 5 days per week. This also included morning hours on Saturday and Sunday and after-hours visits as necessary. Minor surgical procedures (e.g., suturing, splinting) were performed in the office, as well as the administration of allergy shots. Daily phone hour provided a direct link with the doctor to address issues, answer questions parents had, and to provide scheduling.

I was "on call" an average of twice per week as we provided 24-hour coverage 365 days per year for our patients, including daily hospital rounds in both the nursery and pediatric floors at Grand View Hospital, a 235 bed, non-profit general hospital with a 20 bed pediatric unit and a 20 bed level II nursery. The practice averaged approximately 55 newborns per month. I attended repeat and emergency C-sections as well as emergency vaginal deliveries. Newborns that required ventilation or pediatric subspecialty care were transferred to available neonatal centers after stabilization. The practice averaged 16 admissions to the pediatric floor each month, although this was trending downwards. Patients who required intensive or surgical care were also transferred to a children's hospital after stabilization.

I functioned as one of the primary care providers for a group of profoundly disabled children in a local chronic care facility, doing complete evaluations biannually and coordinating their acute and chronic care in a team approach with various health professionals throughout the year. I was frequently consulted by family doctors, pediatricians, and adult colleagues in the community who care for pediatric patients in both inpatient and outpatient settings.

I annually spent at least 7 weeks per year full-time at St. Christopher's Hospital for Children as both ward attending and student teaching attending, directly responsible for resident and student education. As a dedicated member of this university-affiliated group practice, I performed the various tasks and duties of full-time staff physicians - teaching, supervising, counseling, and conducting research. In supervising the activities of the general pediatric service, I shared a major role in the teaching of students and housestaff through rounds and conferences. My practical experience was most beneficial to students and trainees in pediatrics, requiring me to be available throughout the day and to be on call at night. I was also involved in the administrative work of our service. With this level of responsibility, my full commitment of time was to St. Christopher's during the rotation, except for one evening each week devoted to following cases of special interest in my local practice. I was able to pursue problems of interest and new concepts in pediatrics at great length on this academic rotation, an opportunity often lost in a busy private practice. I was stimulated to review the latest medical literature, adding to my personal fund of knowledge, applying it at the community level, and thus, upgrading the quality of pediatric care in my community. This represented continuous professional development at its best.

1995 - 2005 Massachusetts

The hospital-based primary care program - Children's Hospital Primary Care Center (CHPCC) - had active inpatient and outpatient services, providing a strong referral base for the specialty areas of the hospital. CHPCC was the largest single provider of pediatric primary care in Boston, with more than 10,000 patients and almost 34,000 program visits each year to more than 100 providers (faculty physicians, nurse practitioners, and housestaff). I averaged 30 – 35 outpatient visits per week of varying complexity, as many children in our urban practice have health problems complicated by troubled family dynamics and economic hardship. Our practice had approximately 70-80 patients hospitalized each month. Faculty rotated daily rounding throughout the year, each covering our PHA inpatient service 5 weeks per year (on average), until departmental financial constraints in 2002 limited this opportunity. In addition, I was a "Teaching and Care" attending on one of the General Pediatrics Team for 1 month each year, educating housestaff and students and simultaneously being attending of record.

Although my principal responsibilities limited the size of my personal primary care practice as well as the amount of time I was able to devote directly to patient care, I provided our primary care program with the knowledge of a committed, actively involved, experienced practitioner who possesses the desire and ability to contribute new perspectives in patient management to housestaff and faculty that might otherwise lack this valuable viewpoint. My knowledge is tempered by "real world" practice experience, and I have mastered the ability to impart this valuable clinical application to others. I provided new perspectives in patient management through the private general pediatric practitioner's eyes. Housestaff and medical students need to be familiar with and skilled in the management of a wide variety of diseases, and must appreciate when to refer. My role demonstrated a solid working relationship between pediatric generalists and subspecialists and establishes a more balanced training experience. Teaching both the art and science of medicine to physicians in training is particularly valuable and satisfying for both health promotion and disease management.

2005-2010 New Hampshire

The General Academic Pediatrics' Section comprised the generalist core of the Department of Pediatrics and Children's Hospital at Dartmouth. It maintained a broad *mission* to: (1) provide primary care and urgent (same day) ambulatory services to infants, children and adolescents residing in our primary care service area; (2) provide attending level hospitalist services to the CHaD Pediatric and Adolescent Unit; (3) provide attending level coverage to the Normal Newborn Nursery; (4) staff special programs in Adolescent Medicine, the Child Advocacy and Protection Program, the Spina Bifida Program, and the Boyle Program in Community Pediatrics, amongst others; (5) assume major, and disproportionate, responsibility for supervision and teaching within the Residency Program and for DMS students in all four years; (6) improve resident and student education via participation and leadership in national pediatric education organizations; (7) advance the well being of children through research; and (8) improve clinical care and teaching via quality improvement initiatives.

My clinical responsibilities included primary care practice, care of sick ambulatory patients, supervision of the resident continuity clinic, oversight of the Normal Newborn Nursery service, and inpatient attending on the Pediatric and Adolescent Unit. Many children in our rural practice have complex health problems complicated by troubled family dynamics and/or

economic hardship. Although administrative and leadership responsibilities limited the amount of time I was able to devote directly to patient care, I provided our primary care program with the knowledge of a committed, actively involved, experienced practitioner in multiple primary care settings. Teaching both the art and science of medicine to physicians in training is particularly valuable and satisfying.

2010- New York

The Division of General Pediatrics' ambulatory primary care practice at CCMC is dedicated to delivering outstanding, high quality medical care to our patients from infancy through adolescence. Its pediatric medical home is intended to promote the health and well-being of children and their families through anticipatory guidance, preventive wellness, immunizations, timely screenings, treatment of common illnesses, and comprehensive primary care for all children, including those with special health care needs. It also serves as the primary teaching site for many of the pediatricians-in-training at CCMC, who experience how generalists should be the strongest advocates for children. It shoulders much of the teaching responsibilities of medical students and residents, while providing a medical home for children from an incredibly diverse socioeconomic population. Historically, General Pediatrics at CCMC has struggled to live up to organizational expectations regarding continuity, teaching, and financial performance. In addition, the academic advancement of faculty has been modest at best, particularly highlighted with the launch of the new medical school. During my tenure here, change continues. My clinical responsibilities have included primary care practice, care of sick ambulatory patients, supervision of the resident continuity clinic, and oversight of the Normal Newborn Nursery.

Clinical Contributions

Annual Census Report. As Vice President and Secretary of Pennridge Pediatrics Associates, I recognized the importance of efficient administrative time as part of the day-to-day running of a pediatric office. I designed and maintained a monthly clinical and business database to produce an annual 27-page "Census Report." My extensive database management experience permitted me to produce graphic and tabular information for monitoring trends, enrolling patients for studies, managing insurance companies, maintaining staffing requirements, and detailing inventory.

Primary Care at Boston Children's Hospital. Shortly after I arrived at Boston Children's Hospital in 1995, I orchestrated the merger of two separate hospital-based primary care programs (a resident and a faculty program) into one large ambulatory multi-disciplinary practice – Pediatric Health Associates (PHA), now known as Children's Hospital Primary Care Center (CHPCC). It is rapidly moving toward an improved balance of inpatient, ambulatory, and after-hours services, including telephone coverage. I have been a champion of this innovative and advanced concept of fully integrating medical education and research into a comprehensive primary care service. A multi-disciplinary Service Team (i.e., physician leaders in clinical care, education, and research, nursing, social work, and administration) was created to coordinate all aspects of our practice. Since the merger, our hospital-based primary care practice has successfully grown with special programs such as the Young Parents Program (providing specialized care services to adolescent parents and their children), the Advocating for Successful Kids Program (helping children to reach their potential in school), the One Step Ahead Program (helping overweight children manage their nutritional needs and prevent obesity), and the Reach Out and Read program (promoting literacy in the primary care setting). My vision of primary care is for CHPCC to be a nationally recognized model for pediatric primary care that produces physician leaders in clinical care (especially the medically and socially complex), training, research, and community service.

General Pediatric Team Model. With the reorganization of the Children's Hospital medical services to improve continuity between inpatient and outpatient care, I tapped my unique experiences as both a community and hospital-based primary care physician to help create our General Pediatric Team model, using a select group of hospitalists that is quickly becoming a recognized model of expertise for quality care and teaching. The quality of patient care, teaching, and research for general pediatric patients has significantly improved through a more seamless integration of inpatient and outpatient services.

Network of Community Hospitals. I directed the initial birth of our current Community Medicine Program and its operating committee – Network Development and Community Practice. This program's efforts link community hospitals with Children's Hospital in providing care for all children in our region and beyond.

Children's Hospital Inpatient Liaison Development (CHILD) Program. I directed the development and implementation of this program which was designed as a pilot project to improve communications with those community health centers in Boston that routinely refer to Children's Hospital. The target population was inpatient admissions to the general medical ward services. It was felt that the system could one day be expanded to accommodate the dissemination of information to all providers in the community by specialty services in the hospital. Although a qualitative evaluation seemed positive by most users, the re-organization of the medical services, limited information systems expansion, and finances shelved this pilot program.

Quality Improvement Initiatives in Primary Care. I directed the initial development, implementation, and education of quality of care initiatives for our hospital-based primary care practice. This included the design of aims, outcome measures, data gathering methods, and approaches for PHA. In Primary Care, we focus our efforts in health promotion and disease prevention in order to impact the largest proportion of our patients. The particular areas identified were immunizations, health supervision screening, and disease-specific care (e.g., asthma).

Intellicare. I was Pediatric Medical Director for a telephone triage service in primary care for our Pediatric Physician Organization at Children's Hospital (PPOC). I provided physician oversight for the clinical programs provided to clients of Intellicare in a consultant role. I acted as liaison with physicians and functioned as a representative of Intellicare in call clarifications and review, as well as assisted in resolution of disagreements involving their clinical specialty. In addition, I was an educator for IntelliCare clinical personnel and for the larger community of health care providers.

Decision Support Tools for the Public. Together with colleagues and staff at Harvard Medical School's consumer education website (<u>www.intelihealth.com</u>), we created more than 200 webbased decision support tools to demystify for the user/patient the processes that physicians use when taking a medical history based on initial symptoms (we are not providing definitive diagnoses), deciding what therapies to advise based on answers to queries (we are not telling the user what therapy is best), and managing a chronic condition or disease (we are not substituting for the patient-doctor relationship). Using conversational language, we emphasize "transparency" by providing users with information that helps them understand why certain questions are being asked, how an answer guides the physician to move in one direction versus another, and how closed-ended questions asked algorithmically are not random yes/no questions, but lead to hypotheses and decision-making.

Using Interactive Technology To Promote Breastfeeding. I orchestrated all facets of the production of an interactive computer and web-based program (www.feedingyourbaby.org) to raise awareness and to promote continuation of breastfeeding. This user-friendly program presents educational content about breastfeeding in a dynamic, interactive manner using state-of-the-art touch screen technology during the patient's waiting time in the office. Customizable information and results of a needs assessment in this topic area can then be printed for the patient to discuss with their provider during the visit or to take home with them. Usage can be quantified to facilitate informed updates of the material. A faculty colleague and I are conducting a randomized controlled trial of the effectiveness of this health services intervention to promote continuation of breastfeeding.

Using Interactive Technology To Promote Smoking Prevention in Young Girls. I have spearheaded the development of the *No Smoking Room*, (www.nosmokingroom.org), a safe, online patient education site created to empower young girls to say "no" to smoking or to encourage those who are smoking to quit. The website engages 8-11 year old girls through high quality multimedia features. Health professionals are also provided with patient education door hangers that direct young girls and their families to visit the *No Smoking Room* and to educate them about this serious public health issue. Complementing this website, a new pediatric tobacco counseling course for health professionals was recently launched on my health professional in applying concrete strategies to open and maintain the conversation with young girls and their families around smoking prevention and cessation.

Advancing Health Literacy for Families. Child Health Guide (www.childhealthguide.com) is a revolutionary advance in health literacy: it is the only family resource that uses live-action video of real children with real symptoms, illnesses, and developmental milestones. Child Health Guide's rich features, include 200+ videos plus an easy-to-use interactive Symptom Checker, which helps achieve better health outcomes for kids, reduced anxiety for parents, and lower health costs. Working closely with colleagues from Norway, I served as Director of the Medical Advisory Board and envisioned how the use of the Child Health Guide could translate into better usage of medical resources, increased knowledge acquisition and understanding with less anxiety by parents and caretakers, and improved outcomes for children. As a user-friendly program, enhancements were made for families, by families, to present educational content in a dynamic, interactive manner using state-of-the-art technology.

Promoting Oral Health with Bright Futures Core Concepts. I spearheaded the creation and formal evaluation of an online curriculum designed to increase the confidence, knowledge, and clinical performance in oral health and Bright Futures philosophy among pediatric residents. The overall goal was to strengthen and expand pediatric residents' roles as care providers in health promotion and preventive services. We first conducted a cross-sectional assessment of a geographically diverse multi-institutional sample of residents to identify a more detailed look at barriers to applying Bright Futures oral health concepts in continuity clinic. Residents also were found to demonstrate greater skill in communication and partnership building compared with oral health promotion behaviors and performance of an oral examination. Armed with this information, we uniquely conducted the first randomized controlled trial that examines a Bright Futures-based online curriculum about a preventive health service at the national level. We demonstrated that our online educational intervention

(https://www.pediatricsinpractice.org/practice_center/pc_tools_oralhealth.asp) provides a replicable national training model that advances important elements of primary care pediatrics and related policy recommendations vital to health care reform. Further education is needed at a national level if we are to meet Healthy People 2020 goals. This RCT reinforced the need to invest in the review of assessment approaches for new online curricula designed to meet the growing preventive services demands on primary care pediatricians.

Practice-based Research. I was an American Academy of Pediatrics' chapter co-coordinator of the Pediatric Research in Office Settings (PROS) network for 16 years, beginning in 1989. The mission of PROS is to improve the health care of children by conducting national collaborative, practice-based research addressing primary care issues. My extensive experience with office-based research has enhanced my contributions in the network and my peers recognize my expertise in practice-based research. Largely due to my collaborative efforts, the Pennsylvania and Massachusetts Chapters were considered "gold standards" as most effective chapters in the entire network. An increasing number of practicing clinicians expressed interest in participating in clinical research.

Integrating Quality Improvement into Patient-Centered Medical Homes. I have developed, implemented, and evaluated QI activities for both the inpatient (eg, Intrapartum and postpartum Tdap adminstration) and outpatient (eg, Obesity prevention and Breastfeeding promotion) settings. This also includes measurement of immunization rates for the patient-centered medical homes. The incredible variability among clinicians presents the opportunity to explore the quality of clinical care and teaching by enhancing health care personnel interactivity around shared practices using a "Practice Talk" model. On a related note, as Editor-in-Chief of *Pedia*Link for 17 years, the AAP's Online Home for Lifelong Learning (www.pedialink.org), I spearheaded the development of an innovative model that creates and spreads a culture of QI in Pediatrics and fulfills Maintenance of Certification (MOC) requirements by the American Board of Pediatrics. This provides the opportunity for "everyday" pediatricians to become proficient in continuous quality improvement during their day-to-day practice, at point-of-care where it is needed most.

Educating the Public about Pediatrics. I regularly share my knowledge and expertise by educating the public through writing for health information websites and regular participation in media interviews on a variety of pediatric topics. I am responsible for the internet publishing of Pediatric content on Harvard Medical School's consumer education website (www.intelihealth.com); this entails creating, editing, writing, and reviewing important new content, features, and tools as well as continuously updating existing content for clinical accuracy and relevance. As part of my leadership role at both Children's Hospital Boston and Children's Hospital at Dartmouth and as a member of the AAP's Committee on Infectious Diseases, I act as a spokesperson for the news media on a variety of pediatric health care issues including vaccination, diagnosis and treatment of common childhood illnesses and infectious diseases, and practical information for parents, teachers and caregivers. I have appeared on national television (e.g., NBC's Today Show and ABC's World News Tonight), written for national magazines (e.g., Newsweek and USA Weekend), and been interviewed by international, national, regional and local media outlets. I have also been featured in these children's hospital's publications both for internal and external audiences, including publications for referring physicians and parents. In addition, I have given presentations to schools and youth-oriented organizations on various topics for children, families and caregivers of children.

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
