Major Goals: This study applies our health equity lens and research experiences, with input from a Health Equity Scientific Advisory Board that engages local and national African American/Black leaders, to inform local and federal menthol cigarette ban policies by: 1) learning from African American/Black people who smoked menthol cigarettes before menthol was banned, 2) predicting tobacco product use after a menthol ban, and 3) exploring how perceptions of and reactions to menthol bans are influenced by experiences of interpersonal and structural racism.

Major Goals: Our group has expertise in assessing abuse liability (the likelihood that a tobacco product will maintain dependence and long-term use) and here we apply that expertise to examine how FDA might reduce tobacco product abuse liability in a manner that protects public health, while also decreasing tobacco use disparities. This project uses well-established clinical lab and trial methods to examine how lowering electronic nicotine delivery system (ENDS) and oral nicotine pouch (ONP) abuse liability may help to lower tobacco use rates in the long-term. We hope to inform FDA how a systematic approach to lowering the abuse liability of all tobacco products will protect public health, while also helping to reduce long-standing tobacco use disparities.

Major goals: This project develops public education messaging that aims to help prevent cigarillo smoking initiation among Black young adults. Developed messages communicate the health harm and nicotine addiction risks of cigarillo smoking alone and contextualized with outcome expectancies about cigarillo smoking. Through a distinguished co-mentoring team, this K99 mentored phase of the career transition award (K99/R00 Pathway to Independence in Tobacco Regulatory Research) also provides Dr. Phan with substantial training in tobacco regulatory science, tobacco use disparities, health communication, eye-tracking research, and randomized controlled trials. This research is among the first to develop cigarillo smoking prevention messages for Black young adults and will inform the FDA on effective public education messaging strategies to reduce tobacco use disparities and promote equity. Message effects will be tested through an eye-tracking experiment and randomized controlled trial with Black young adults in the proposed R00 phase.

Findings will have strong potential to inform culturally competent intervention/prevention efforts for alcohol and drug problems.

Major Goals: Aligned with our legacy and present work, this collaboration with the
departments of African American Studies (AFAM) and Gender, Women’s and Sexuality
Studies (GSWS) at Virginia Commonwealth University that aims to address systemic
injustices within Black communities. VCU AFAM and GSWS propose to establish a
Richmond Freedom School that will serve three cohorts of undergraduate students
recruited from disciplines across the university for eight-week summer workshops over the
three-year project period. In Phase 1, VCU participants will receive foundational
instruction in content that lies at the intersections of both disciplines of AFAM and GSWS.
We will situate this content within the local context of Richmond, Virginia – a majority
Black city with a history that is of great significance to the evolution of anti-/Blackness in
the U.S. and the city in which VCU is located. During Phase II, participants will
collaborate on photovoice research projects based on a modified facilitators guide for the
Youth Empowerment Alliance at Rutgers University. Research questions generated by
group discussions that arise during content-based workshops will drive the photovoice
projects. Participants will apply theoretical frameworks, and historical, social, and
behavioral content to address an issue or initiative relevant to their communities.
Participants will learn to analyze, interpret, provide commentary, and display data. RFS
Phase III of dissemination will consist of in-person presentations at community forums
intended to raise awareness about social inequities that disproportionately burden Black
people who reside in RVA, research topics, data available for community use, and findings
by the RFP participants. Projects will also be disseminated to local radio broadcasts. The
final step of this project will be to develop an RFS website that will house a digital archive
of participants' projects resources that can be leveraged by community organizations to
support their work.

Interdisciplinary Research Methods in African American Studies (AFAM 399). Semester course; 3 lecture hours. 3 credits. Introduces students to the interdisciplinary processes whereby scholars develop their arguments and interpretations concerning the black experience. Students will develop increased skills in library research and an awareness of qualitative, mixed, and quantitative research methods. Students will be introduced to the need for critical analysis, the role of biases and frames of references and the reason why scholars working in the field often reach different conclusions with reference to issues of fact, interpretation, and significance. Capstone Seminar in African American Studies (AFAM 499). Semester course; 3 lecture hours. 3 credits. This senior seminar involves the planning and execution of a research project grounded in the methodology of African American studies. Spring 2018 <n=12 students>; Fall 2017 <n=6 students>.

Advocacy, Activism, and Social Justice in Black America (AFAM 491). Semester course; 3 lecture hours. 3 credits. Fulfilling the democratic promise of equity in effort to achieve social and health justice in black America requires the participation of an “organized activist” citizenry able to formulate, articulate and assert its shared interests. In this course, students learn gain leadership skills by organizing a leadership team to collectively mobilize members of a “constituency” to work together to achieve measurable outcomes in pursuit of a shared purpose by the end of the semester. Students learn five core leadership practices: building public relationships, turning values into a capacity for agency through public narrative, turning resources into power by strategizing; turning intentions into effective action; and structuring organization to develop leadership, engage constituents, and achieve goals. Students develop peer mentoring skills and learn to distinguish “mobilizing” from “organizing” and why it takes organizing to make mobilizing count. Spring 2017 <n=20 students>.
