Introduction

The Food and Drug Administration FDA is the regulatory, scientific, public health and consumer protection agency responsible for ensuring all human and animal drugs, medical devices, cosmetics, foods, food additives, drugs and medicated feeds for food producing animals, tobacco and radiation emitting devices safe, and effective.

The mission of the Center for Drug Evaluation and Research (CDER) is to perform an essential public health task by making sure that safe and effective drugs are available to improve the health of people in the United States. CDER regulates over the counter and prescription drugs, including biological therapeutics and generic drugs.

The Office of Surveillance and Epidemiology (OSE) within CDER works to detect, assess, prevent, and manage the risks of medications so that they can be relied on to treat disease and improve health. OSE participates in the safety analysis of drugs before they are marketed to patients and consumers and utilizes risk assessment tools after products are marketed to identify and assess adverse events and medication errors that did not appear during the drug development process.

The Office of Medication Error Prevention and Risk Management (OMEPRM) is responsible for the following: post-marketing evaluation of all medication error reports and for dissemination of evaluations to appropriate FDA offices; medication error risk assessment support (including review of proposed proprietary names, carton and container labeling, and potentially error prone aspects of product design), medication errors and systems to enhance the safety of medications to medical review divisions in areas of responsibility; and evaluating and analyzing Risk Evaluation and Mitigation Strategies (REMS) proposals and REMS assessments.

The OMEPRM Immediate Office manages the Divisions of Medication Error Prevention and Analysis I and II, Risk Management, and Mitigation Assessment and Medication Error Surveillance, each of which performs the scientific review and evaluation of drugs subject to regulation by CDER.

Duties/Responsibilities

As the **Office Director**, the incumbent will provide executive leadership and direction to the OMEPRM Immediate Office and four subordinate Divisions: Medication Error Prevention and Analysis I and II, Risk Management, and Mitigation Assessment and Medication Error Surveillance. In this capacity, the incumbent is expected to provide regulatory and technical direction; oversight to programs and operations; and develop policy and strategic goals for the Office. Specific duties include the following:

- Represents CDER's management and provides management, direction, coordination, and leadership to the divisions involved in complex regulatory matters relating to medication error prevention and analysis, including issues involving product design, labels, labeling, packaging and human factors assessment, and risk mitigation, including REMS and REMS assessments.
- Manages a diverse professional staff which conceives and develops scientific methods, in conjunction with other CDER offices to measure, evaluate, and conduct continuous surveillance of marketed drugs, with particular attention to medication error reports. The OMPREM Director is also responsible for implementing the provisions of the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act concerning REMS.

- Provides the OSE Director with authoritative information on the status of ongoing Office- wide reviews and evaluates industry-generated safety reports, research summaries and studies submitted to CDER, and advises on appropriate actions.
- Reviews, evaluates, and researches needs and regulatory requirements on a continuing basis for program adjustments and cost efficacy to meet the Center’s mission, needs, and priorities.
- Reviews and discusses with OSE Director scientific and regulatory decisions of the most controversial, complex, or critical nature. Coordinates drug programs with regulatory programs of the agency. Assigns responsibilities to each division and delegates authority, determines policy, and promotes productive and cooperative working relationships among the divisions.
- Assists OSE Director, Deputy Director, and other Office Directors fully informed of programs, resources, and related considerations that would bear upon the planning, development, and administration of the diverse programs of CDER and OSE.
- Reviews Office requests for funds and personnel; evaluates budget estimates and justifications and makes appropriate recommendations to the OSE Director; and directs budget for staff, which includes medical, scientific, administrative, and support personnel assigned to the divisions.

Supervisory Responsibilities: Provides occupational-specific technical and administrative direction and supervision 25% or more of the time to subordinate supervisors, team leads and/or staff performing the work and functions of the organizational unit. Obtains resources and identifies strategic objectives for the organization. Provides authoritative and professional expertise in health sciences, including medication error prevention and risk management related to the regulation of drugs and therapeutic biological products; and serves as expert adviser and technical authority on analyzing, advising, and resolving complex and precedent-setting policy and program issues. Is responsible for developing policies, strategies, and plans to address cross-cutting population health issues.

Conditions of Employment

- U.S. Citizenship requirement or proof of being a U.S. National must be met by closing date.
- Employment is subject to the successful completion of a background investigation, verification of qualifications, completion of onboarding forms, submission of required documents, and any other job-related requirement before or after appointment.
- Applicants must meet all qualification requirements by the closing date of this announcement.
- Direct Deposit: You will be required to have all federal salary payments electronically deposited into a bank account with a financial institution of your choice.
- FDA participates in e-Verify: All new hires must complete the I-9 form; this information will be processed through e-Verify to determine your employment eligibility. If a discrepancy arises, you must take affirmative steps to resolve the matter.

- Males born after December 31, 1959, must be registered with the Selective Service.
- Financial Disclosure may be required.
- Ethics Clearance may be required.
- Background Investigation/Security Clearance is required. All employees must pass a security investigation. Failing to pass the background check may be grounds for removal or legal action. If hired, you may be subject to additional investigations at a later time.

2. Qualified and Outstanding Candidates
 - a. **Qualified** applies to all candidates for Cures appointments. The FDA OTS will use the basic requirements defined in the [OPM Qualification Standards](#) as a baseline for comparing experience levels and other candidate attributes for relevant positions.
 - b. **Outstanding** candidates can be defined by existing outstanding work experience, outstanding performance rating, or both.

Desired Education, Experience, Professional Experience:

Our ideal candidate will possess:

- Experience managing planning, organizing, monitoring, and providing expert advice and leadership on regulatory program segments, functions, and activities to a highly trained and skilled staff of health professionals, scientists, and/or multi-disciplinary professionals in a regulatory program.

- Mastery of, and skill in applying expertise in, advanced professional theories, principles, concepts, standards, and methods of pharmacy and/or drug regulatory process sufficient to serve as expert to resolve difficult problems and issues, as well as plan, design, monitor, and evaluate complex projects.
- Demonstrated ability to identify and analyze problems; weigh relevance and accuracy of information; generate and evaluate alternative solutions; make recommendations.
- Demonstrated mastery and application of the Food and Drug Administration Amendments Act, regulations, policies, and procedures related to the regulation and evaluation of drugs and biologic products.

Education Transcripts

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SUBMITTING YOUR TRANSCRIPTS: Positions which are scientific or technical in nature often have very specific educational requirements. A transcript is required to verify educational achievement. Pay careful attention to the Qualifications and Education sections to identify vacancies where a transcript is required. Even if you hold a similar position or are a current FDA employee, you are not exempt from transcript requirements.
